Gale editors are now preparing the first volumes in the *Shakespearean Criticism* series, designed to provide much needed support to the Shakespeare courses offered in nearly every high school and college. This new series will present a selection of critical excerpts on Shakespeare's plays and poetry and will serve as an introduction to the most significant commentators on his work.

The complete plays will be covered in five volumes, each containing criticism on seven or eight plays. Also planned are volumes covering poetry, costume design and theatrical production, plus other special topics.

Each entry will consist of these elements:

- Title heading
- Historical-critical introduction
- Excerpts from criticism (representative selections from nearly 400 years of criticism)
- Annotated bibliography.

The *bistorical-critical introduction* identifies dates of composition, performance, and publication, including discussion of the text

through its various emendations throughout history (First Quarto, First Folio). It discusses the sources (Holinshed, earlier plays) used by Shakespeare in the creation of the play and provides an overview of the importance of the play as an entity and its importance to the canon as a whole, linking it historically, technically, and stylistically to the other plays.

The *criticism* section is arranged chronologically in each entry. Each piece of criticism is accompanied by a complete bibliographical citation designed to facilitate location of the original essay or book by the interested reader. An *annotated bibliography* appears at the end of each entry and suggests additional reading on the work. This section also contains annotations on works that do not fall within the scope of the series.

Shakespearean Criticism will include an appendix that lists the sources from which material in the volume is reprinted. Each new volume will also provide cumulative indexes to critics and the works of Shakespeare that appear in the entire series.
